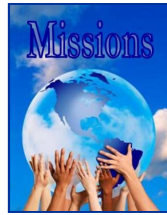

Pastor's Corner

WE ARE ALL EQUAL HERE

Jesus turned the world on its head when he stepped onto the scene and his disciples perpetuated the upsetting of convention and norm. In the first century church they earned the reputation of "turning the world upside-down." What Jesus actually did was simply level the playing field using the cross and resurrection as his implement. The Lord's table is a celebration of the "fall of the walls" that once divided us from God and each other. It is the only thing which is even remotely close to tradition that our Lord left with us to carry on until He comes again. It serves a constant reminder of the equality that we have in Christ. It is the one place where we can clearly express the connection that we have with Him and with one another. Here is an example:

"Once when the Duke of Wellington remained to take communion at his parish church, a very poor old man went up to the opposite aisle, and reaching the Communion table, knelt down close by the side of the Duke. (Immediately, tension and commotion interrupted the silence of the church.) Someone came and touched the poor man on the shoulder, and whispered to him to move farther away, or to rise and wait until the Duke had received the bread and the wine.

But the eagle eye and the quick ear of the great commander caught the meaning of that touch and that whisper. He clasped the old man's hand and held him to prevent his rising; and in a reverential but distinct undertone, the Duke said, 'Do not move; we are equal here.'

"We are all equal here." This is more than a statement of civil rights or a preamble to a constitution – it is the bedrock of our Christian life! It is upon this foundation that we can connect to Christ and to one another!!
