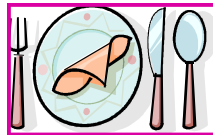

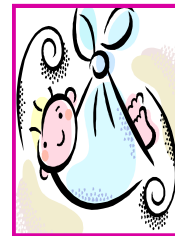

Pastor's Corner

ERECTING A MEMORIAL

"In the future, when your children ask you, 'What do these stones mean?' tell them that the flow of the Jordan was cut off before the ark of the covenant of the Lord...these stones are to be a memorial to the people of Israel forever." (Josh 4:6-7 NIV)

This weekend our country celebrates an annual holiday - Memorial Day. This is a time to reflect upon a life of military service, to watch a formation of aircraft demonstrate maneuvers, or to stand at a military memorial and mark the significance of blood spilled, lives lost, and battles won in the quest for Freedom. The neat rows of grave markers at Arlington National Cemetery and the walls of neatly etched names of heroes, which fell in Vietnam, serve as memorials. These are physical monuments that serve as a keystone to our memories raised toward the sky and in effect saying, "This is something worth remembering!"

The cost of freedom is better appreciated when standing upon a memorial built astraddle a sunken warship in Pearl Harbor or when touching the cold indentions upon marble that spell out a life, a cause, and a death. The flag snapping in a breeze or a 21-gun salute punctuate our thoughts with the exclamation points of value, worth, and honor. Three millennia ago in the midst of the Jordan crossing the Israelites were to select 12 large rocks that would be stacked at the first "Riverside Memorial Park of Israel". As families journeyed by this "historical marker" the children would undoubtedly ask, "Daddy, how did those big rocks get there?" and "Daddy, where did they come from?" Every family would have a perpetual and knowledgeable tour-guide who could point to "Twelve Rocks Monument" and say, "These rocks stand here today because Jehovah God parted the waters for our fathers to cross at the time of flood stage. The same Jehovah God who moved then on our behalf still moves today!"
